GENERAL INFORMATION

HISTORY

In 1978 several Louisville area churches of Christ created the Portland Christian School of Biblical Studies in Louisville, Kentucky, for the purpose of providing knowledge of the Bible, growth in faith and Christian character, and training in Christian service. The School of Biblical Studies was the college-level division of PCS. In 2010, with the blessing of PCS and the churches, SBS changed its name to Kentuckiana Bible College; its purpose, administration, support system, and mission statement remained unchanged. We seek to know Christ personally through His Word, not merely know the Bible as an end in itself (John 5:39-40).

MISSION STATEMENT

“The objective of Kentuckiana Bible College is to provide an opportunity for a thorough grounding in the Word of GOD for all who wish to serve the Lord Jesus Christ and His church. We aim to maintain an environment for free, open study of the Scriptures. While recognizing that GOD calls and empowers His servants, we believe it is our responsibility to carry out the command of 2 Timothy 2:2 to commit to faithful men and women what we have learned that they may be able to teach others. The primary thrust is to provide training conducive to the development of spiritual leaders equipped and eager to serve the LORD in these last days.”

LOCATION AND FACILITIES

All regular classes meet at the main campus, located in the Buechel Church of Christ building, 2105 Buechel Bank Road, Louisville, Kentucky.

Extension classes meet at other locations as needed. An additional extension class meets at Harrodsburg during some fall terms.

The R.H. Boll Library is housed in the Buechel Church of Christ building.

KENTUCKIANA CONSORTIUM OF RESTORATION COLLEGES

The Kentuckiana Consortium of Restoration Colleges (KCRC) was formed in 1991 by three institutions of Christian higher education which are associated with the Restoration Movement: College of the Scriptures, Louisville Bible College, and SBS (now Kentuckiana Bible College). It is a cooperative effort to provide greater opportunities for students at these three schools, as well as for area churches and individual Christians. Each college remains on its own campus and operates independently under its own Board of Directors. The institutions all have their own unique emphasis and specialties, but share a common purpose: training preachers and other Christian workers.

KCRC permits students to cross-register at member institutions by paying only the tuition costs. Admission and registration fees are paid only at the home institution. Work taken at any KCRC school will count toward the student's class load determination. Students may use the libraries at all three colleges and will be issued a KCRC library card.

LICENSE

Kentuckiana Bible College is licensed by the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, and is seeking affiliation with the Association of Biblical Higher Education.

ADMISSION

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission to Kentuckiana Bible College should be considered an honor and a privilege. All students wishing to be considered for admission to KBC must meet the following requirements:

1. Graduate from an accredited/approved high school with a "C" or better grade average, or G.E.D. equivalent.
2. Show evidence of high moral character.
3. Show appreciation for the spiritual standards of KBC.
4. Be willing to conform to all rules and regulations of the school.
5. Complete the admission and registration procedures. Kentuckiana Bible College reserves the right to cancel admission whenever it becomes evident that it is not in the best interest of the student or the school.

ADMISSION PROCEDURES

Any student seeking admission to Kentuckiana Bible College must:

1. Submit a formal application for admission (applications are available from the school office).
2. Request that an official transcript of high school record or copy of G.E.D. results be sent to KBC (not required if auditing).
If applicable, request an official transcript from post secondary institution be sent to KBC for evaluation.
3. Students who have not completed high school or obtained a G.E.D. may enroll as a "special student" for the purpose of "auditing" classes.
5. A \$10.00 application fee is required of all first time students.
6. KBC requires prospective students to take a "placement test" in English and Bible.

REGISTRATION

At an appropriate time prior to the beginning of each new term, course offerings will be published along with instructions for registration. Application for admission must be accepted before a new student may register for classes. Normally, accounts are due and payable before registration can be completed.

1. Pre-registration, regular registration, or late registration fee must accompany the registration form.

* A \$10.00 application fee is required of **all first time students** (those who have never taken classes at any time in the past, prior to the current semester.) Students are exempt from this fee if they have taken classes at **any time** in the past, prior to the current semester.

2. 20% of the class fees must be paid at registration.
3. Remaining fees must be paid by the end of the second month.
4. Failure to pay fees, or make satisfactory arrangements, will result in the student being refused entry into the class.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

HOUSING

Kentuckiana Bible College does not own or maintain any facilities for housing students; however, every effort will be made to aid students, including couples and families, in securing local housing. It is the responsibility of the student to notify the school of such need prior to enrollment.

STUDENT CONDUCT

“It is the belief of the faculty and administration of Kentuckiana Bible College that the Scriptures provide clear guidelines for Christian behavior. Therefore, KBC students are expected to adhere to the following Biblical standards. Failure to do so forfeits the privilege of KBC student status.”

1. Practices which are specifically forbidden in the Scriptures are not permitted. These include dishonesty, theft, vandalism, fornication, adultery, homosexual behavior, immodest dress, profanity, gossip, and drunkenness.
2. In a Christian academic community, academic dishonesty, including cheating, plagiarism, and misappropriation of library materials or other college property are regarded as serious violations of Biblical standards.
3. Abuse of one's body is inappropriate behavior for a Christian. Accordingly, students of KBC will not possess or use tobacco, illegal substances, or unprescribed stimulants or depressants.
4. Scripture explicitly teaches respect for governmental authorities; therefore, students are expected to respect and uphold the laws of the local community, the state, and the nation.
5. Students enroll in KBC to prepare to serve our Lord; therefore, an important part of their training includes being in regular worship attendance with other Christians.

DISMISSAL AND PROCEDURE FOR REDRESS

A student may be requested to withdraw from KBC if it is deemed that such action best serves the interest of the student and/or the interests of KBC. This request may be based on student conduct which is inconsistent with the ideals of KBC, failure to perform satisfactory class work, or accumulate excessive absences. A dismissal becomes part of the student's permanent record.

A dismissed student may appeal, in which case said student shall arrange to appear before the Executive Committee at its next regularly scheduled meeting. Said student shall provide evidence for his/her grievance.

Spouses of paying students may take classes at 1/2 cost. Senior citizens may audit classes, but must pay the registration fee, and cost of any required books.

UNPAID ACCOUNTS

Student accounts are due and payable at the beginning of each semester. If an account remains unpaid, KBC retains the right to withhold grades and/or transcripts until such time as the account is satisfied. Students may not register for classes until past accounts have been paid, or adequate arrangements made.

REFUND POLICY

1. A student who pays tuition and other instructional charges in advance, then fails to enroll, must provide a written withdrawal notice to KBC requesting a refund.
2. If a student is asked to withdraw from KBC, said student shall provide a written withdrawal notice requesting a refund. Withdrawal forms must be signed by the class instructor.

3. All refunds will be made within thirty (30) days after written notification of withdrawal. The following scale shall govern the pro-rated refund.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

DEGREES OFFERED

BACHELOR DEGREE:

The four-year **Bachelor of Biblical Studies (B.B.S.)** program is designed to equip students with increased understanding and application for ministering the Word of GOD. The curriculum is structured to train people for Christian service- Bible Class Teachers, Preachers, and Elders.

Bachelor of Christian Service (BCS) and **Bachelor of Youth Ministry (BYM)** degrees are offered, also.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE:

This two-year program provides first-year foundation courses necessary for continued study. The second-year student selects an area of study in Preaching Ministry, or Christian Service.

CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENTS

The following definitions are used by the school to classify the student body:

Full Time - A student who is enrolled for twelve (12), or more, semester hours for credit. No student will be permitted to take more than 18 hours per semester.

Part-Time - A student who is enrolled for eleven (11) semester hours, or fewer, for credit.

Freshman: has completed less than 30 semester hours with a GPA of at least 2.0.

Sophomore: has completed 31-59 semester hours with a GPA of 2.0.

Junior: has completed 60-89 semester hours with a GPA of 2.0.

Senior: has completed 90 semester hours with a GPA of 2.0.

Auditor: attends class without working for or receiving a grade or credit.

One credit hour requires 50 minutes of actual class time per week for 15 weeks.

GRADING SYSTEM

At the end of the semester each instructor will report a course grade to the Registrar for each student enrolled for credit which will become a part of the student's permanent record. Final course grades will be recorded using the letter system:

"A" = superior work

"B" = above average

"C" = average

"D" = below average

"F" = failure

"I" and "W" are used to indicate "incomplete" or "withdrew". The "I" grade automatically becomes an "F" grade if class requirements are not completed before the close of the following semester.

KBC uses a "four-point" scale to determine GPA:

A = 4 B = 3 C = 2 D = 1 F = 0

(Example) If a student made an "A" (4 points) in English 101 (3 credit hours), and a "B" (3 points) in Bible 101 (3 credit hours), his average grade (GPA) would be (21 points divided by 6 hours = 3.5, or B+). An overall GPA of 2.0 is required to graduate.

CLASS ATTENDANCE

All classroom instruction at KBC is intended to give glory to GOD, and prepare students to better serve Him. Thus, attendance is imperative! Absences will be judged (excused or not excused) by the class instructor. A student who is late to class three times, should receive an unexcused absence.

Make-up work is given for all excused absences. Leaves-of-absences cannot be granted, except for illness, or other emergencies.

Enrollment for credit will not be allowed after the second week of instruction in any semester.

TRANSCRIPTS

Any student needing a transcript of work done at KBC should make a written request to the Registrar's office. Each student will be entitled to one free transcript; a charge of \$2.00 will be made for each additional transcript. If a student is under financial obligation to the school, the request for a transcript may be denied.

CURRICULUM

BACHELOR DEGREE PROGRAM

The four-year BACHELOR DEGREE in BIBLICAL STUDIES, CHRISTIAN SERVICE, or YOUTH MINISTRY requirements are: Completing a minimum of one hundred twenty-four (124) selected credit hours from the prescribed curriculum, with a minimum grade point average of 2.0.

Transfer students must earn a minimum of sixty-two (62) credit hours from KBC to qualify for the BBS degree.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

BIBLE

BB101 Old Testament Survey.....3 Hours
An historical overview of the Old Testament as a chronological unit, rather than a book by book survey; with emphasis on the redemptive theme that runs throughout the Old Testament.

BB102 New Testament Survey3 Hours
An historical overview of the New Testament with primary emphasis on the unfolding plan of redemption. The survey will include a chronological examination of the birth and development of the church.

BB110 The Life and Teachings of Jesus3 Hours
The life of Christ examined chronologically, including a survey of His teachings as recorded in the Gospels.

BB111 Acts of the Apostles.....3 Hours
An expository study with emphasis on the developing precedents of the church. Paul's missionary journeys will allow brief introductions of his epistles written during those journeys.

BB201 Romans/Galatians3 Hours
An expository study emphasizing the righteousness of God, the sinfulness of man, redemption through Christ by faith, and striving to live holy lives.

BB214 Prison Epistles3 Hours
An analytical study of Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon, emphasizing the application of the message to every-day Christian living.

BB221 Hermeneutics3 Hours
An examination of the principles of Biblical interpretation, emphasizing historical background, literary form, context and progressive revelation.

BB301 The Pentateuch3 Hours
An expository examination of Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy, focusing on the sin problem, the Mosaic Law, and God's redemptive work. Relevant historical, archeological and scientific data will be introduced.

BB302 Wisdom Literature3 Hours
A study of selected texts from Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

BB 306 Isaiah / Jeremiah3 Hours
This study examines the ethical implications of being God's people, then and now, His holiness and judgment, His plan to send His Messiah, and His Holy Spirit, and to establish His kingdom.

BB312 Pastoral Epistles3 Hours
An expository study of I & II Timothy and Titus, emphasizing the daily responsibility of ministering to the people of God.

BB 314 Hebrews3 Hours
An expository study emphasizing the superiority of the priesthood of Christ, the finality of the cross as a sacrifice for sin in the New Covenant, and the confidence of the believer.

BB318 Daniel / Revelation3 Hours
An expository study emphasizing the sovereignty of God throughout history, in the present, and in Christ's triumph over evil at His return, focusing on the eternal glory promised to His followers.

BB404 Minor Prophets3 Hours
A survey of the twelve minor prophets, emphasizing the unique message of each one, with application to present-day spiritual conditions.

BB408 New Testament Church2 Hours
A Biblical examination of the church, universal and local: its headship, ordinances, purpose, membership, organization, discipline, ministries, and expansion.

- BB410 Eschatology**3 Hours
An examination of the “last things”, emphasizing the intermediate state between physical death and resurrection; Christ’s return; anti-christ and the great tribulation; resurrection, judgment, the millennium, and hell and heaven.
- BB411 Epistles of Peter and John**3 Hours
An expository study emphasizing historical setting and contemporary application.
- BB412 The Person and Work of The Holy Spirit**3 Hours
An examination of His deity, personality and ministry: His work in conviction, regeneration, holy living (fruit) and spiritual service (gifts).
- BB414 Doctrine of Salvation**2 Hours
A study of salvation past, present and future: God’s part (justification, adoption, regeneration, sanctification and glorification) and man’s part (repentance, confession, faith, and abiding in Christ).
- BB415 History of the English Bible**2 Hours
An historical survey of the origin of the English Bible, the principles of translation, and an analysis of major current versions.
(This course is the same as BB415; students may receive credit for completion in one discipline, only; or it may be used as an elective. The registrar must be notified of the student’s intent.)

CHRISTIAN SERVICE

- CS101 Introduction to Computer Basics**2 Hours
Instruction given in basic computer use, mouse skills, saving documents; Internet skills are taught.
- CS118 Personal Evangelism**2 Hours
An examination of the content of the gospel, man’s required response, emphasizing evangelism through love, being sensitive to situation and needs of people, and new converts follow-up work.
- CS119 Field Work**2 Hours
Designed to give practical experience in various church ministries such as VBS, camp and personal evangelism. Interested students should contact KBC Executive Committee at least six weeks prior to the time they plan to be involved in a project. The choice and completion of a project must be overseen by a faculty advisor, who shall be appointed by the Executive Committee. Credit will be given in proportion to the nature of the project. Students may receive a maximum of two credit hours while completing their four-year academic program.
- CS205 Life and Work of the Preacher**3 Hours
An examination of the diverse roles and responsibilities of the located minister: his home and family, personal finances, study habits, library, funerals, weddings, counseling and related areas.
- CS206 Local Mission Work**2 Hours
An examination of the Biblical basis, emphasizing the guiding principles in its commission to evangelize, with special focus on working in local mission efforts and the practical aspect of starting new congregations.
- CS207 Work of the Church I**2 Hours
Examination of the unchanging purpose of the church, the practical means of fulfilling that purpose, and the use of specialized ministries within the congregation.

CS208 Work of the Church II	2 Hours
A continuation of CS207. Prerequisite CS207	
CS211 Role of Women	2 Hours
An examination of Biblical principles, and current opportunities, for women to serve Christ in the home, the church, the mission field and society at large.	
CS261 Sight-Singing and Song Leading	1 Hour
A thorough study of the fundamentals required to be an effective acappella song leader.	
CS305 Youth Work	2 Hours
This study is designed to teach students, specializing in youth ministry in local congregations, how to lead children to Christ, and encourage them to cling to their new faith. (Also classified as YM305 in Youth Ministry. Students may receive credit in but one area of discipline, and must notify the registrar.)	
CS309 Foreign Mission Work	3 Hours
A survey of cross-cultural missions: its definition, motive, strategy, methods and communication. Emphasis will be on world needs, the "call" and spiritual warfare.	
CS311 Christian Marriage and Home	3 Hours
An examination of the principles, attitudes, and activities related to Christian courtship, marriage and family, with emphasis on current social problems. Includes guidelines for pre-marital and marital counseling.	
CS419 Senior Seminar (TBA)	2 Hours
YM101 Introduction to Youth and Family Ministry	3 Hours
YM201 Adolescent Spiritual Formation	3 Hours
(See YM course descriptions on p.25-26)	

EDUCATION / PSYCHOLOGY

EP120 Methods of Bible Study	2 Hours
Various methods of Bible study are discussed and investigated, making practical application to specific scripture texts.	
EP191 Christian Growth and Development	3 Hours
An examination of Christian growth to maturity, with emphasis on walking by the Spirit, cross-bearing, forming disciplined habits and examining various temperaments to better understand ourselves and others.	
EP231 Principles of Christian Education	3 Hours
This course surveys all aspects of Christian education with emphasis on effective teaching and learning processes.	
EP331 Christian Education in the Local Congregation	3 Hours
An analytical examination of a Christian Education program in a local congregation, exploring the areas of organization, administration, curriculum, teacher training, and faculty utilization.	
EP419 Pastoral Counseling	3 Hours
An introductory course, emphasizing qualities necessary to become an effective spiritual counselor. Case studies and role-playing provide practical training in common counseling situations.	
YM101 Introduction to Youth and Family Ministry	3 Hours
YM201 Adolescent Spiritual Formation	3 Hours
(See YM course descriptions on p.25-26)	

GREEK

GR251 Greek IA4 Hours
A study of the fundamentals of the Koine Greek vocabulary and grammar.

GR252 IB4 Hours
A continuation of GR251, with emphasis on translation of simple New Testament passages. Prerequisite GR251

GR351 IIA3 Hours
An advanced study of Greek grammar and syntax. Includes translation work in the writings of John. Prerequisite GR251 & GR252

GR352 IIB3 Hours
A continuation of GR351. Prerequisite GR351

HISTORY

HS141 Church History I3 Hours
An examination of the church from its beginning through the Middle Ages (30-1500 A.D.), emphasizing the movement of believers, who, seeking to follow Scripture, rejected the worldly state-church system.

HS142 Church History II3 Hours
An examination of the church from the Reformation (1500's) to the present, with emphasis on spiritual revivals in various times and places.

HS143 Church History III.....3 Hours
An examination of the history of the churches of Christ since the 1906 United States Census of Religious Bodies recognized as official the divide of the Churches of Christ and the Christian Churches. Students would recognize differences and developments in teachings in various times and places among these churches from 1906 to the present, with an emphasis on the influence of social issues.

LANGUAGE & COMMUNICATIONS

LC100 Non-Credit Remedial English.....3 Hours
Required of students who do not qualify for LC101. This class does not fulfill the English requirements, but counts as an elective.

LC101 Principles of Written English I.....3 Hours
This course will emphasize proper grammar, sentence structure paragraphs breaks, and progression of thought, in producing acceptable communications.

LC102 Principles of Written English II.....3 Hours
A continuation of LC101, with emphasis on methods of research writing. Prerequisite LC101

LC121 Homiletics3 Hours
The study and practice of preparing and presenting sermons, emphasizing the mechanics of public speaking - including oral presentation, and use of voice and body language. Emphasis continues regarding sermon preparation – Bible study, content selection, “aiming” the message, and organizing materials. Each student will be required to give short speeches in class to gain practical experience. Local congregations will be contacted to allow students opportunities to speak.

PHILOSOPHY

PH201 Christian Ethics.....3 Hours
An examination of Christian standards of right and wrong, including the Ten Commandments as elaborated in the New Testament, emphasizing family duties, work ethic, and contemporary issues of war, citizenship, poverty, abortion and euthanasia.

PH203 Systematic Christian Doctrine I3 Hours
A survey of the themes of the Bible, including the Godhead, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the Scriptures and the nature of man.

PH204 Systematic Christian Doctrines II3 Hours
A continuation of PH203 including surveying the doctrine of salvation (Soteriology), the New Testament church, angels, Satan and end-of-time events (eschatology). Prerequisite PH203

PH205 Introduction to Apologetics.....3 Hours
An investigation of the purpose and need of apologetics in Christianity, and an overview of arguments offered in defense of the Christian faith.

PH372 Theism vs Humanism.....3 Hours
An examination of the origin of these world views, emphasizing how origins affect personal life philosophies, with focus on church–state issues.

PH490 Scientific Creationism.....3 Hours
An examination of origins, contrasting the Genesis record with modern theories of beginnings, such as evolution.

YOUTH MINISTRY

YM101 Introduction to Youth and Family Ministry.....3 Hours
Introductory course, emphasizing core essentials for those who wish to become youth ministers. Uses the book This Way to Youth Ministry: An Introduction to the Adventure (YS Academic), by Duffy Robbins.

YM201 Adolescent Spiritual Formation.....3 Hours
Explores the struggles adolescents and their parents and peers face as youngsters develop spiritually. Reading includes Presence-Centered Youth Ministry: Guiding Students Into Spiritual Formation, by Mike King; and, Starting Right: Thinking Theologically About Youth Ministry, by Kenda Creasy Dean, Chap Clark, and Dave Rahn.

YM202 Counseling Adolescents.....3 Hours
Examines how counselors, pastors and youth workers can help the struggling adolescent, emphasizing recognition of common problems for youngsters. Text book: The Comprehensive Guide to Youth Ministry Counseling, by Les Parrott III.

YM301 Advanced Youth Ministry3 Hours
Examination of using transferable principles to build the foundation of Christian faith into adolescent lives, emphasizing the fundamental purposes of evangelism, discipleship, fellowship, ministry, and worship. Helps to build a healthy youth ministry by identifying concerns, implementing solutions, and establishing relationships. Text book: Purpose Driven Youth Ministry, by Doug Fields

YM301 Advanced Youth Ministry.....3 Hours
Examination of using transferable principles to build the foundation of Christian faith into adolescent lives, emphasizing the fundamental purposes of evangelism, discipleship, fellowship, ministry, and worship. Helps to build a healthy youth ministry by identifying concerns, implementing solutions, and establishing relationships. Text book: Purpose Driven Youth Ministry, by Doug Fields

YM305 Youth Work2 Hours
This study is designed to teach students, specializing in youth ministry in local congregations, how to lead children to Christ, and encourage them to cling to their new faith. (Also classified as CS305 in Christian Service. Students may receive credit in but one area of discipline, and must notify the registrar.)

YM401 Family Based Youth Ministry.....3 Hours
Examines a multigenerational approach to discipling teens, and building long-term, deep-impact ministries to teenagers. Presents ways to realize that young people belong in the life of their church, and the church belongs in the lives of its youth. Text book: Family-Based Youth Ministry Revised and Expanded, by Mark DeVries

YM402 Youth Ministry Internship (summer).....3 Hours
Not a class, but a practicum.
